Harm Reduction

The Martinsburg Initiative sends a social worker to Harm Reduction two days a week throughout the summer. On Wednesdays, Harm Reduction is located at the Berkeley Morgan Health Department from 1:00 – 3:00 PM. On Fridays, Harm Reduction is mobile and travels to an at-risk neighborhood. Harm Reduction provides clean needles, Narcan, first aid supplies, resources, support, and more. The Martinsburg Initiative recognizes this important collaboration with the Recovery Resource Center and Berkeley Morgan Health Department.

H.O.M.E

Progress has been made on the H.O.M.E (Home On Martin for Everyone)! Partnering with Berkeley County PTA Clothing Closet, the H.O.M.E will provide not only clothes but also products, food, and other supplies for anyone in the community in need. Students at the Job Corp are currently building shelving for several rooms. Proctor and Gamble has provided funding for supplies and social work support. This summer, TMI staff has been working hard to move all items from our prior Community Cupboard into the H.O. M. E. and to organize everything. Watch for the H.O.M.E to be open for the start of school!





KID-VERSE

KID-VERSE is a new outreach of TMI this summer. KID-VERSE is the TMI kid's universe. It's a place where anyone can be a kid and play. We have various outdoor games and activities for kids of all ages to enjoy. We want to provide the opportunity for kids to explore, use their imaginations, and learn new skills while making memories with their family or caregivers. We also get to connect with new people and reconnect with others. We have already watched kids learn new skills, talk to parents about our program, and helped provide opportunities for parents to play with their children. Currently, we are set up at War Memorial Park, by the creek, on Thursdays from 10-12. Hopefully, we are able to continue this into the future and use KID-VERSE at various community events or random pops up to provide fun for the whole family.

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EVALUATION FINDINGS

PUBLIC SAFETY, Trauma-Informed Training

Trauma-informed training for police provides members of local law enforcement with the information and tools necessary to identify and properly interact with those individuals who may have been exposed or are susceptible to experiencing trauma. Upon completing the TMI Trauma-informed Training, law enforcement officers complete pre and post Attitudes Related to Trauma Informed Care: ARTIC 10 scales. This screening instrument was developed by the Traumatic Stress Institute of Kleinberg Family Centers and by researchers from Tulane University. The ARTIC 10 scale is a self-report, psychometric tool designed to assess attitudinal or cultural change related to trauma-informed care over time.



Trauma-Informed Training

TMI coordinates the delivery of Trauma-informed Training to key groups in the community, including educators, community partners, Shepherd University Education majors, Sociology majors, and healthcare providers. TMI trauma training build awareness and skills and provide tools to identify and serve children who may have been exposed to or are at-risk for experiencing trauma. Following training, the various audiences were assessed for changes in knowledge of the effects of trauma.

EDUCATOR TRAUMA CERTIFICATION

TMI Trauma Sensitive Educator Certification is awarded to educators who complete all training sessions in the TMI trauma-informed pathway: ACEs 101, Frameworks that Foster Resilience, Secondary Traumatic Stress, Strategies for De-escalation, Nurtured Heart Approach Sessions 1, 2, and 3, and Yoga in the Classroom. Completing all training sessions ensures that educators have awareness, skills, and tools to identify and serve children who may have been exposed to, or are at risk for, exposure to trauma. To attain TMI Trauma Sensitive Educator Certification, educators must also demonstrate implementation of knowledge learned through a successful classroom observation one month after training.

To further understand the impact of the Trauma Sensitive Educator training, educators were also assessed for increases in knowledge and use of trauma-sensitive practices and perception of student engagement in school before all training sessions and at the end of the training.




TOO GOOD FOR DRUGS

Too Good for Drugs (TGFD) is a ten-lesson prevention education program for grades K-12 that seeks to mitigate risk factors and enhance the protective factors related to substance use. TMI and school staff implemented this program with fidelity in 11 target schools, ranging in grades K-5, 6, and 9.

NURTURING PARENTING


Nurturing Parenting Programs aim to build parenting skills. Day Report Center (DRC) and TMI staff offered two Nurturing Parenting courses to:

> Nurturing Parenting Families in Substance Abuse Treatment and Recovery (offered weekly for 17 sessions)

Nurturing Parenting Nurturing Skills for Families

Parents who completed the full 17-week Nurturing Parenting Program: Families in Substance Abuse Treatment and Recovery Course were assessed for improvements across the five domains of parenting through AAPI2 pre-and post-tests.






