September has been a busy month at Rosemont Elementary School! Students were welcomed to Rosemont and started their first week with school counselors, administrators, teachers, and TMI staff teaching and modeling the schoolwide PBIS school expectations. For many students at Rosemont, this was their first school experience. The overall atmosphere in the school was welcoming and positive!

In the first month of school, TMI has 16 students signed up at Rosemont to begin/resume mentoring with our partners at the Air National Guard. The relationship between the students and the members of the Guard has been overwhelmingly positive; students look forward to their day to meet with their mentor! TMI also partners with another mentor, who follows one of his students to Rosemont when the student changes schools. The student was so happy to hear that his mentor, Mr. Lyle, would be meeting with him again! We are so grateful for the partnership with each mentor, who makes a difference in each student's life.

Too Good for Drugs lessons began; 19 classes received ongoing instruction in this prevention education curriculum, for a total of 10 lessons in each class. That is a total of 190 lessons taught school-wide by the end of the year. 25 students are also currently receiving individual and group skill-building sessions/case management from the TMI social worker at Rosemont.



Berkeley Medical Center's Addictions Program is a diverse team comprising Peer Recovery Support Specialists (PRSS), SBIRT Providers, medical providers, and administrative staff. PRSS and SBIRT Providers skillfully conduct screenings for substance use disorders and determine the level of risk. They offer brief, impactful interventions while cultivating meaningful relationships with patients in order to facilitate harm reduction, treatment, and recovery efforts.



Our staff offers referrals and warm handoffs to outpatient and inpatient addiction treatment and also aids in initiating medication for opioid use disorder (MOUD) through the Bridge to Recovery Program.

Harm reduction initiatives include the distribution of fentanyl test strips, Deterra medication disposal kits, and Take Home Narcan to reduce the risk of overdose. During patient interactions, staff also identify needs related to social determinants of health and offer referrals to community resources for mental health, insurance, housing, and more.

This year, SBIRT began screening youth in the emergency department, and many families are referred to The Martinsburg Initiative for services. Since its beginnings in the emergency department, the program has expanded to provide addiction services on all hospital floors. For the past three years, The Martinsburg Initiative has supported the growth of the hospital's Addictions Program by providing critical funding for a Linkage to Care Coordinator (Nycole Kothe) and SBIRT Providers (Lisa Naab) while offering supplies and technical guidance.






